Appendix III: Methods for Weighting the Data

A. Columbiana County Health Needs Assessment 2018 Community Survey Data: Data from sample surveys have potential for bias if there are different rates of response for different segments of the population. In other words, some subgroups of the population may be more represented in the completed surveys than they are in the population from which surveys are sampled. If a sample has 25% of its respondents being male and 75% being female, the sample is biased towards the views of females (if females respond differently than males). This same phenomenon holds true for any possible characteristic that may alter how an individual responds to the survey.

In some cases, the procedures of the survey methods may purposefully over-sample a segment of the population in order to gain an appropriate number of responses from that subgroup for appropriate data analysis when investigating them separately (this is often done for minority groups). Whether the over-sampling is done inadvertently or purposefully, the data needs to be weighted so that the proportioned characteristics of the sample accurately reflect the proportioned characteristics of the population. In the 2018 Columbiana County survey, a weighting was applied prior to the analysis that weighted the survey respondents to reflect the actual distribution of Columbiana County based on age, sex, race, and income.

Weightings were created for each category within sex (male, female), race (White, Non-White), Age (8 different age categories), and income (7 different income categories). The numerical value of the weight for each category was calculated by taking the percent of Columbiana County within the specific category and dividing that by the percent of the sample within that same specific category. Using sex as an example, the following represents the data from the 2018 Columbiana County Survey and the 2017 Census estimates.

In this example, it shows that there was a slightly larger portion of males in the sample compared to the actual portion in Columbiana County. The weighting for males was calculated by taking the percent of males in Columbiana County (based on Census information) (50.28111%) and dividing that by the percent found in the 2018 Columbiana County sample (52.85714%) [50.28111/52.85714= weighting of 0.951264 for males]. The same was done for females [49.71889/47.14286% = weighting of 1.054643 for females]. Thus males' responses are weighted less by a factor of 0.951264 and females' responses weighted greater by a factor of 1.054643.

This same thing was done for each of the 19 specific categories as described above. For example, a respondent who was female, White, in the age category 35-44, and with a household income in the 50-75k category would have an individual weighting of 2.94805 [1.05464 (weight for females) x 0.97898 (weight for White) x 2.64482 (weight for age 35-44) x 1.07959 (weight for income 50-75k)]. Thus, each individual in the 2018 Columbiana County sample has their own individual weighting based on their combination of age, race, sex, and income. See next page for each specific weighting and the numbers from which they were calculated.

Multiple sets of weightings were created and used in the statistical software package (SPSS 24.0) when calculating frequencies. For analyses done for the entire sample and analyses done based on subgroups other than age, race, sex, or income – the weightings that were calculated based on the product of the four weighting variables (age, race, sex, income) for each individual. When analyses were done comparing groups within one of the four weighting variables (e.g., smoking status by race/ethnicity), that specific variable was not used in the weighting score that was applied in the software package. In the example smoking status by race, the weighting score that was applied during analysis included only age, sex, and income. Thus a total of eight weighting scores for each individual were created and applied depending on the analysis conducted. The weight categories were as follows:

- 1. **Total weight** (product of 4 weights) for all analyses that did not separate age, race, sex, or income.
- 2. **Weight without sex** (product of age, race, and income weights) used when analyzing by sex.
- 3. Weight without age (product of sex, race, and income weights) used when analyzing by age.
- 4. Weight without race (product of age, sex, and income weights) used when analyzing by race.
- 5. **Weight without income** (product of age, race, and sex weights) used when analyzing by income.
- 6. Weight without sex or age (product of race and income weights) used when analyzing by sex and age.
- 7. **Weight without sex or race** (product of age and income weights) used when analyzing by sex and race.
- 8. Weight without sex or income (product of age and race weights) used when analyzing by sex and income.

B. Columbiana County Health Needs Assessment 2018 *Profiles of Student Life, Attitudes and Behaviors: Developmental Asset Survey:* Youth data presented in this report is from the Search Institute's; *Profiles of Student Life, Attitudes and Behaviors: Developmental Asset Survey.* The survey is administered to 7th, 9th, and 10th grade students in 10 out of the 11 public school districts in Columbiana County. To ensure complete anonymity, no names or identifying numbers were used. Parents were notified of the survey administration and given the option of withdrawing their student (s).

The survey is conducted every two years (even years). The data set displayed in this report is from the most recent findings (fall, 2018) through the Search Institute, Minneapolis MN. Total sample of youth surveyed for the 2018 Developmental Asset Survey was n= 2,314. A total of 794- 7th grade, 748- 9th grade, and 754- 10th grade students. To create the final data set, multiple careful reviews were made of individual survey responses. For the 2018 Columbiana County survey report, 344 surveys were eliminated due to missing data, filling in long patterns of responses rather than answering questions thoughtfully, reporting a grade level other than those intended to be surveyed. The number of surveys discarded represents 13% of the total number of surveys received by the Search Institute. Typically, for online surveys, between 15-25% of surveys are discarded for the above reasons. If the percentage of discarded surveys was greater than 25%, caution should be used in interpreting the results as survey bias may be present.

The students are administered an anonymous online survey of 160 questions during the school day at their respective school districts. Participating school districts receive individual district data as well as a county aggregate report. The information portrayed in the CHNA is representative of our county aggregate report. Comparison data has been compiled from previously conducted Developmental Asset surveys in Columbiana County.

B. Top 10 Community Concerns/Issues Related to Health and Safety:

- Drug addiction
- Environmental issues (air & water quality, gas lines, fracking, agriculture run-off)
- Lack of transportation
- Poverty/generational poverty/housing/homelessness
- Drug-related crime and hostile behavior
- Untreated mental health issues/lack of access to mental health providers
- Poor parenting skills/child safety
- Unhealthy lifestyles
- Lack of affordable insurance/lack of providers accepting medical cards/denials
- Lack of knowledge about health

Other issues mentioned with less frequency included: access to specialists, violence, poor nutrition/hunger, no inpatient psychiatric services, disrespect/lack of civility, and unsafe schools.

4. Overcoming Barriers to Access and Program Participation

A. Barriers to Access

Over half of the stakeholders and focus group members (52%) identified "lack of transportation" as the single most important barrier to accessing resources and/or participating in programming. "Lack of motivation/apathy" and "cost/money/poverty" were both equally mentioned by 14% of respondents. Other barriers listed at 6% or less of the total responses included: stigma, lack of time, inadequate childcare, and pride.

The top 4 suggestions for overcoming barriers and increasing program participation included:

- 1. Increase awareness (through social media/advertising)
- 2. Provide transportation
- 3. Provide participation incentives
- 4. Use community outreach to take programs and services to the people

Other suggestions included:

- Use bilingual forms and advertising
- Offer programs at different times

- Rethink how information is presented
- Vaccinate at schools
- Provide more funding

B. How to Improve Participation

When asked in a separate but related question what area organizations could do to increase participation and/or help area residents improve their health, the top 12 responses were:

- 1. Increase awareness
- 2. Provide more outreach locations
- 3. Encourage healthy lifestyles
- 4. Agencies work together & coordinate services
- 5. Offer more health services in schools
- 6. Provide incentives for participation
- 7. Build trust between providers & clients
- 8. Simplify application process for clients to qualify for programs
- 9. Provide transportation
- 10. Provide community education
- 11. Provide support to parents/non-traditional families
- 12. Provide more funding for programs/grants


5. How to Improve Community Supports


- 1. Increase access to mental health services

Developmental Deficits in Youth

Assets form part of the developmental foundation upon which healthy lives are built. Although Search Institute advocates positive, community-based efforts to promote Developmental Assets in young people, communities must also focus attention on preventing the developmental deficits measured through the survey. Developmental deficits are the negative influences that can interfere with the ability to develop into a healthy, successful adult. These influences limit a young person's access to external assets, block their development of internal assets, and ease the way into risky behavioral choices.

Five developmental deficit conditions were evaluated in this survey, including being home alone two or more hours per school day; exposure to TV and video programming three or more hours per day; victimization by


household physical abuse; victimization by violence outside the home; and exposure to tobacco, alcohol, marijuana and other substance use at parties.

The percentage of Columbiana County surveyed youth reporting each of these five developmental deficits is shown for the total sample, gender and grade level. Each deficit is correlated here with a high-risk behavior.

- Youth perception of marijuana use is perceived to be at a much lower risk as compared to alcohol, tobacco, and prescription drug use in the asset categories of 0-10, 11-20, and 21-30.
- Youth perception of regular alcohol use is reported at a much lower risk as compared to tobacco or prescription drug use.
- Youth who possess 31-40 assets perceive alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, and prescription drug use to be at a moderate to high risk.
